Artist Statement

I create a purely imaginary realm, where I portray nature through tree trunks, branches and vegetation as symbols of life, hope, and renewal.

Nature opens itself to us, and invites us into a world filled with hope, where one can escape and free his/her emotions.

Human beings are at the centre of my artworks, depicted alone and isolated, confronted to their fears, worries and doubts. They are imprisoned in their emotional cages, and do not appear to be interacting with their surrounding environments.

It is through the imagination that we create a passage from our inner world to our outer world, a path that each of us can follow in these difficult and sombre times we are experiencing.

Colour plays an essential role in my paintings. It creates a contrast that highlights the feelings of estrangement and isolation, which emanate from my artworks.

My goal is not to relay a specific message, but to transcend a sensation, to allow viewers to integrate their experiences into my paintings and reflect upon their ways of living with(in) themselves.

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
